Assignment 2 is a group work (4 or 5 students in one group) and it should be submitted through email. More details about the assignments will be provided on the course page. Late submissions will not be accepted.

Exams: Exam dates are tentatively fixed (Mid-term exam on Thursday, May 7th and final exam on Tuesday, June 23rd). Exam questions will be from the main textbook discussed in class. No multiple choice questions. No make-up exams.
